What is Attruby™ (acoramidis)?

Attruby is a prescription medicine used to treat adults with a disease that affects the heart muscle called cardiomyopathy of wild-type or variant transthyretin-mediated amyloidosis (ATTR-CM), to reduce death and hospitalization related to heart problems.

It is not known if Attruby is safe and effective in children.

Supporting a loved one with ATTR-cardiac amyloidosis (ATTR-CM)

Understanding ATTR-cardiac amyloidosis (ATTR-CM) and why it happens

ATTR-cardiac amyloidosis (CAR-dee-ak Am-ee-loy-DOE-sis), sometimes called transthyretin cardiac amyloidosis, is a serious, progressive heart condition.

There are 2 forms: wild-type, which is caused by aging, **and hereditary**, which is when the condition is passed down through families.



ATTR-CM is caused when a protein called transthyretin (TTR) becomes unstable



Stable TTR is an important protein that helps transport hormones and vitamins in the body



Some people have unstable TTR, which breaks down into abnormal proteins called **amyloid fibrils**



These **amyloid fibrils build up in the heart**, preventing it from working properly, and may eventually lead to heart failure

A diagnosis of ATTR-cardiac amyloidosis (ATTR-CM) can turn life upside down, **not just** for the person diagnosed, but their loved ones, too.

Serious symptoms are often overlooked or misdiagnosed

Being able to recognize symptoms is an important way to understand how your loved one is doing. It's also valuable information to help you keep track of your loved one's health and share with their doctor, so together they can make informed decisions about care.

Other symptoms may include:

- Shortness of breath
- Tiredness or weakness.
- Swelling in legs and feet
- Irregular heartbeat
- Digestive problems
- Nerve pain

Proven Results with Attruby™ (acoramidis)


Attruby is a transthyretin (TTR) protein stabilizer that treats wild-type and hereditary ATTR-cardiac amyloidosis (ATTR-CM)



Attruby delivered rapid and sustained results in wild-type and hereditary ATTR-CM

In a 30-month study, **people treated with Attruby did significantly better** than those not taking Attruby (placebo). Results were based on a combined measure of:









When comparing results in people treated with and without Attruby at 30 months, people taking Attruby achieved:



81% survival rate vs 74% without Attruby



50% reduction in the number of hospitalizations due to heart issues

(On average, 0.3 vs. 0.6 visits per year)



A better health-related quality of life*†

Possible side effects may include diarrhea and abdominal pain. For most people, these side effects were mild and went away, so they could continue taking Attruby.

- *The treatment effect of Attruby on health status was assessed using the Kansas City Cardiomyopathy Questionnaire-Overall Summary score composed of the Physical Limitation, Symptom, Social Limitation, Quality of Life, and Self-Efficacy domains, respectively.
- [†]At the end of the 30-month study of adults with ATTR-CM, on average, people taking and not taking Attruby experienced a decline in their KCCQ-OS, a measure of health-related quality of life.

Learning to live with a diagnosis of ATTR-cardiac amyloidosis (ATTR-CM)

A serious diagnosis can stir up intense emotions, but it may also be a relief to finally have answers.

Read on for some tips and ideas that others like you have found useful.

- Work on your communication skills together: when difficult conversations arise, don't be afraid to share your feelings, worries, and needs. Being honest can help save you energy, and help you grow together.
- Understand your partner's condition: knowing about ATTR-CM and how Attruby™ (acoramidis) works can help prepare you for conversations with doctors. As you learn more, write down any questions that may come up.
- Keep organized: maintaining a planner for doctors' appointments, scheduling follow-ups, and taking notes can be helpful for both you and your loved one.
- **Be kind:** being a care partner can be challenging at times, as is living with a progressive disease, but you are both deserving of kindness and empathy from each other.
- Try to actively listen: it takes time, so be patient with yourself! If all else fails, take a breath and revisit once everyone has simmered down.





Taking care of yourself

- Make time for yourself every week. Step away from your caring responsibilities and schedule something just for you. You deserve it.
- Lean on your community. If you have relatives or friends nearby who can help, ask them to pitch in. A little help can go a long way.
- Get active. Physical activity not only keeps you healthy, but it's also an incredible stress reliever. It could be as simple as a walk around the block after dinner.
- **Get sleep.** Sleep is a powerful healer and essential to maintaining good physical and mental health.
- **Eat well.** Try to incorporate fresh fruit and vegetables into your diet, and try not to eat on-the-go too much.
- Watch out for your own mental well-being. If you start to feel overwhelmed, talk to your healthcare provider sooner rather than later—help is available for you, too.


Whether you need help understanding insurance or information about benefits you may be eligible for, help is at hand.

IMPORTANT FACTS

Attruby™ (ah-troo-be) (acoramidis) tablets

This is only a brief summary of important information about Attruby and does not replace talking to your doctor about your condition and your treatment.

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Before taking Attruby, tell your healthcare provider about all your medical conditions, including if you:

- are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if Attruby will harm your unborn baby. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you become pregnant or think you may be pregnant during treatment with Attruby. You may also report your pregnancy by calling the BridgeBio reporting line at 1-844-550-2246.
- are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed. It is not known if Attruby passes into your breast milk. Talk to your healthcare provider about the best way to feed your baby during treatment with Attruby.

Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements.

How should I take Attruby?

- Take Attruby exactly as your healthcare provider tells you to.
- Take Attruby tablets by mouth 2 times a day, with or without food.
- Swallow tablets whole. Do not cut, crush, or chew tablets.



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- · stomach-area (abdominal) pain
- · diarrhea

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Call your doctor for medical advice about side effects. You may report side effects to FDA at 1-800-FDA-1088.

How should I store Attruby?

- Store Attruby tablets at room temperature between 68°F to 77°F (20°C to 25°C).
- Store in original blister card until use to protect from moisture.

Keep Attruby and all medicines out of the reach of children.

General information about the safe and effective use of Attruby.

Medicines are sometimes prescribed for purposes other than those listed in a Patient Information leaflet. Do not use Attruby for a condition for which it was not prescribed. Do not give Attruby to other people, even if they have the same symptoms you have. It may harm them. You can ask your pharmacist or healthcare provider for information about Attruby that is written for health professionals.

What are the ingredients in Attruby?

Active ingredient: acoramidis

Inactive ingredients: croscarmellose sodium, magnesium stearate, microcrystalline cellulose, and silicon dioxide. The film coating and printing ink contain black iron oxide, glyceryl monocaprate, hypromellose, polyvinyl alcohol, propylene glycol, talc, titanium dioxide, and vinyl alcohol graft copolymer.
